Carnegie Building

The seismic retrofit of the City's Carnegie Building has entered the homestretch. Finally, after all the interior structural work, there is evidence of change as the new tile roof rapidly approaches completion. Faber Construction Corporation has very little left to complete of the work, and the \$660,400 contract is anticipated to be completed on time and within budget.

87.5% of the cost of the safety upgrade was paid by Federal Emergency Management Agency and Washington State Department of the Military Emergency Management Division funds. The local share was paid by a combination of Carnegie Foundation funds and lease and rental revenues paid for use of the building. Carnegie Libraries were a hallmark of up-and-coming cities at the turn of the last century. Snohomish's reputation as a historic town in this century is the result of preserving legacy buildings such as this one. The seismic retrofit will help ensure it is not only historic, but also as seismically safe as if it were built under current building codes.

The list of general actions will be evaluated first within three major categories: (1) stormwater, (2) habitat, and (3) shellfish.
