



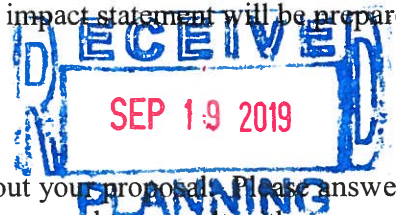

STATE ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT (SEPA) CHECKLIST

PURPOSE OF CHECKLIST

The State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA), Chapter 43.21C RCW, requires all governmental agencies to consider the environmental impacts of a proposal before making decisions. Non-project action: amendments are proposed to the City of Snohomish Land Use Development Code (Title 14 SMC), to consolidate the "Public Parks" land use designation and the "Open Space" designation into a single designation - "Parks, Open Space & Public". The new designation was adopted by the City Council as an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan in December, 2018.

Affected chapters include: SMC 14.205 (Permitted Land Uses), 14.207 (Land Use Tables), 14.210 (Dimensional Standards), 14.235 (Off-Street Parking, Loading, and Access Requirements), 14.240 (Landscaping, Screening, Fencing, and Retaining Walls), and 14.242 (Wireless Communications Facilities). Proposed changes will consolidate the two land use designations, and change references for internal consistency.

The proposed amendments to Title 14 SMC are not expected to result in increased discharge to water, emissions to air, production, storage, or release of toxic hazardous substances, or production of noise. The non-project action will change development regulations, but the amendments are not expected to generate unmitigated adverse impacts. The proposed amendments relate specifically to implementing a zoning change, with associated language revisions for internal consistency.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce such increases are:

No measures are proposed, because no adverse impact is expected. Future proposals for development will follow the established permitting process, including a separate SEPA process if applicable, and will be reviewed for compliance with adopted regulations that are intended to facilitate the identification and mitigation of potential adverse impacts.

2. How would the proposal be likely to affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life?

The proposed amendments are not likely to affect plants, animals, fish or marine life. The amendments do not expand the general range of uses currently permitted in the city or relax any existing regulations for the protection of plants, animals, fish, or marine life.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve plants, animals, fish, or marine life are:

No mitigation measures are necessary for the non-project legislative action. If significant adverse impacts related to specific development proposals are identified during the permitting process, appropriate mitigation measures will be required pursuant to the City's SEPA authority and other applicable laws and regulations.

3. How would the proposal be likely to deplete energy or natural resources?

The proposed non-project legislative amendments are not anticipated to deplete energy or natural resources. Future project-level applications for development must comply with all applicable standards related to energy conservation and efficiency.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve energy and natural resources are:

No mitigation measures are proposed, since no adverse impact is expected. Future non-exempt, site-specific development or land use proposals will be subject to compliance with regulations for energy efficiency as well as project-level environmental analysis and threshold determinations.

4. How would the proposal be likely to use or affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated (or eligible or under study) for governmental protection; such as parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands?

No impacts are anticipated. Existing regulations that provide protection of environmentally sensitive areas are expected to provide adequate and appropriate mitigation. Critical area impacts and mitigation associated with any development proposal will be evaluated according to best available science and the substantive regulations currently adopted in the SMC.

Proposed measures to protect such resources or to avoid or reduce impacts are:

No mitigation measures are proposed, since no adverse impact is expected. Critical area impacts and mitigation associated with any development proposal are evaluated during project review for consistency with best available science and the substantive regulations currently adopted in the Municipal Code.

5. How would the proposal be likely to affect land and shoreline use, including whether it would allow or encourage land or shoreline uses incompatible with existing plans?

The non-project action is not expected to result in significant adverse land use impacts, or an increased likelihood that incompatible land conflicts will result. The proposals are generally expected and intended to promote land use compatibility, by consolidating two very similar zones into one. Shoreline areas are regulated under the City's Shoreline Master Program, which is not affected by the current proposal.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce shoreline and land use impacts are:

Compliance with applicable land use regulations and engineering standards, the SEPA process, and the City's land use review processes will minimize the potential for land use conflicts and ensure consistency with all existing land use plans.

6. How would the proposal be likely to increase demands on transportation or public services and utilities?

No increase in demands on transportation or public services and utilities is expected to result from the proposed amendments.

Proposed measures to reduce or respond to such demand(s) are:

No measures are proposed because no adverse impacts are anticipated. Demands on transportation or public services and utilities are evaluated on a project-specific basis for compliance with applicable standards and mitigation requirements.

7. Identify, if possible, whether the proposal may conflict with local, state, or federal laws or requirements for the protection of the environment.

No such conflicts have been identified. The proposed legislative amendments do not affect the critical areas regulations for the City of Snohomish.
